Make a Royal Crown


- Print off copies of the crowns. If you know your crowd will be younger or not have parental help, consider cutting the crowns out a head of time.

- 4. Place tape, glue or a stapler out on the table so they can assemble the pieces when they're done decorating.









- You DON'T need the pipe cleaners.










Help the billy goats cross the bridge!


The Spider and the Flea (Grimm's Fairy Tales) or Spider-Man

- They can decorate their spiders however they want.
